### PRESIDENT'S GREETING

FELLOWS OF THE AMERICAN LARYNGOLOGICAL ASSOCIATION:

The nostalgic desire to meet old friends and discuss with them problems relating to Rhinology and Laryngology, has to be deferred to another year, when transportation difficulties shall have become less urgent.

Throughout the entire sixty-four years of the existence of this Organization, following the Annual Meeting, Transactions have been published. This year, your Council has published this volume—herewith; and it is hoped that it will be of value to everyone interested in Rhinology and Laryngology.

Many thoughts and problems present themselves in our particular specialty relating to the furtherance of the War and the post War times, and it would seem very fitting to suggest that thought be given to some few of them:

- 1. Continuance and maintenance of the high standards of the American Board of Otolaryngology in the selection and qualification of candidates,
- 2. Rehabilitation in Rhinology, Laryngology and Phoniatry of the returned service men and women,
- Conditions produced in the mucous membranes of the upper and lower respiratory tract incident to extremes in atmospheric pressure changes,—aviation, submarine hazards,
- 4. Nutritional studies as applied to our special field,
- 5. Chemotherapy, including the sulfo drugs and derivatives, and also the use of Gramacin, Penicillum, etc.
- 6. Further studies in relation to surface tension and mucous membranes, and the investigation of the action of wetting agents on them and the effect of these agents on bacteria,
- 7. Studies of the pH factors in regard to the application of medication to the mucous membranes,
- 8. A more practical application of allergy,

- 9. Repeated studies of biopsy material, particularly by pathologists acquainted with nose and throat histopathology before a conclusion is reached.
- 10. A never-ending practice of an orderly examination of the interior of the nose, nasopharynx and larynx.

Your Council shall continue to function and notify you from time to time regarding the affairs of the Association.

To those Fellows in the Military Service, we send our Greetings and God Speed.

To those Fellows, because of age or physical disabilities, who are not members of the Armed Forces, we say—Carry On.

To all others of our Association,—Greetings and Best Wishes.

May the "mellow light of Victory\*" shortly illuminate Old Glory and the banners of the United Nations.

### FOREWORD

OR THE first time in the sixty-five years of its existence the American Laryngological Association, through a high sense of service to the country in time of war, this year omitted its Annual Scientific Congress. Without the medical papers which customarily make up the greater part of the published transactions, it appeared for a brief moment as though there might be a hiatus in this long and distinguished line of volumes as well.

It was presently realized, however, that here was an opportunity for the publication of an Index of the whole sixty-five volumes—an index badly needed. Since the last compilation in 1928 much valuable research has been recorded which has been difficult of access owing to the necessity of combing, volume by volume, the Tables of Contents arranged only in chronological and not in alphabetical sequence.

The present index, arranged both by titles and by authors, will be of great service to students and writers. To many whose personal libraries do not contain complete series of the Transactions but who have access to them through school and society libraries, this volume will have a special appeal.

In the preparation of the new index the classification has with a few exceptions followed those of the previous ones. The new material, comprising the last fifteen years, has been distributed among the old and, while its identity is lost, it is much more completely cross-indexed than previously. For the sake of uniformity some of the older headings and sub-headings have been retained, but for convenience many subjects have been repeated under new headings.

The deviation from the familiar green binding was necessitated by the restrictions of the government and not through choice. It will be remembered that the volume for 1919 was likewise garbed in black.

The Fellows of the Association and all others who labor in the fields of laryngology may well turn for inspiration to the long line of scientific contributions whose titles are marshalled on these pages.





### WILLIAM P. WHERRY

#### 1880-1942

The announcement of Dr. Wherry's death on June 13, 1942 came as a terrible shock to his host of friends and admirers, of whom it is safe to say, no other man in American medicine had more and no other otolaryngologist as many. He had been taken ill at the meeting of the American Board in New York City the year before, but after a short rest, had again plunged into his many strenuous professional activities, with the result that after the Board meeting in Philadelphia in June 1942 he suffered a heart attack on the train returning to Omaha and died shortly after his arrival. So passed away one of the most colorful, useful, hard-working figures in American Otolaryngology and, indeed, in American medicine, one of the most beloved in our specialty and one the like of whom appears not oftener than once in a generation.

Bill Wherry had such a diversity of interests that it is impossible to catalog them all or to do justice to any one. Perhaps his most outstanding characteristic was his organizing ability and in this he was preeminent. Becoming Secretary-Treasurer of the American Board of Otolaryngology on the death of our fellow-member, Dr. Hanau W. Loeb, in 1927, he skilfully guided this group through most of its early years and guided so well that its procedure became a model for other boards, formed later, to follow. This called for an enormous amount of work on his part, but of work he was never afraid and he never spared himself. His other great work and interest was the American Academy of Ophthalmology and Otolaryngology, of which he had been Executive Secretary since 1926, having previously served as Secretary of the Section on Instruction and later as first Vice-President. Since 1930 also he had edited the Transactions of the Academy and had himself contributed largely in procuring news items and writing editorials. It was largely by his foresight and through his efforts that the Academy today occupies its high position as a teaching organization. The fact that he was also a prominent ophthalmologist made him the more fitting for his

position and contributed to his understanding of the needs of both specialties.

Dr. Wherry was born of English parents in Omaha, Nebraska on June 16, 1880, and there he lived his entire life. Educated in the local schools, he worked his way through the medical school of the University of Nebraska, graduating in 1903 and thereafter studying for a year in Knapp's Clinic in New York City. At this time, he began the study of otolaryngology under Dr. F. S. Owen in Omaha. He became a staff member of the Presbyterian, Wise Memorial and head of the Department in the St. Catharine and Swedish Mission Hospitals; and Professor and Chairman of the Department of Otorhino-laryngology in the College of Medicine of the University of Nebraska.

In 1924 he was elected a Fellow of the American Laryngological Association and 1st Vice-President in 1936. He was chairman of the Section of Otolaryngology of the American Medical Association in 1933, President of the Omaha-Douglas County Medical Society in 1917, of the Medical Society of the Missouri Valley in 1932, of the Nebraska State Medical Society in 1942 and was Vice-President of the Advisory Board of the Medical Specialties from 1934 until his death. Wayne University conferred on him the degree of Doctor of Science in 1941. He was a Fellow of the American College of Surgeons and of the American Laryngological, Rhinological and Otological Society and the American Otological Society.


Early in his career he became closely associated with the medical departments of a number of railroads and his interest continued throughout his life. Through this association, interest and acquaintance, it was possible to so satisfactorily arrange the numerous long trips of the American Board, where everything was done for the comfort and enjoyment of the members of the group, including stop-offs and layovers in places of scenic or historic interest. He was Head and Neck Surgeon of the Union Pacific, the Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis and Omaha, and the Chicago and Northwestern railways.

Of hobbies and recreations there were many. Dancing was one, especially in his early days, and golf until recently. Baseball was a major interest and where time was available during conventions

or meetings, he was a regular attendant at the games. Football also had his attention, and at fall meetings there was always a radio in the executive office on Saturday afternoon with which he could, with similarly inclined friends, follow the game, especially when Nebraska was playing. He was always a loval and optimistic fan. His most consuming diversion, however, and one to which, during many years, he devoted many hours, was stamp collecting. He maintained a correspondence with collectors and dealers all over the world, and at the time of his death, was said to possess one of the most extensive and finest collections in the country. He thoroughly enjoyed, and was skillful at, card games. He was also interested in the work of the Young Men's Christian Association and in his fraternity—Phi Rho Sigma. He was a member of the University Club, the Athletic Club and the Happy Hollow Club, all of Omaha, and the University Club of Chicago. He took an active interest in the Republican party and in the Methodist Church.

In 1904 he married Miss Eugenia Van Epp, of Catawba Island, Ohio. There were three children. The eldest, Walter, was a graduate in Medicine, a former Resident of the Massachusetts Eye & Ear Infirmary, and at the time of his sudden death early in 1943, had succeeded his father in practice. Perdita (Peggy), now Mrs. Carr, is well known to all of us who have attended the meetings of the American Academy, where she was for years an assistant to Miss Clare McGovern, his devoted Secretary, and in the Academy business office. The youngest son, Robert, is in college.

Bill Wherry will be long remembered by all of us, and we will never cease mourning for him. He was a true friend, a most interesting personality, a great organizer, an indefatigable worker and a valuable member of any society to which he belonged. His undying monuments will be the American Board of Otolaryngology and the American Academy.




## RICHMOND McKINNEY 1871-1942

Dr. McKinney died on June 30, 1942 at his home in Memphis, Tennessee. He was born in Memphis on June 6, 1871, the son of James McKinney, merchant, of Virginia, and Maria Berry of Kentucky. Educated in the public schools of Memphis, by private tutors and at the Christian Brothers College, he studied medicine at the University of Tennessee, obtaining his degree of Doctor of Medicine in 1895. At a somewhat later date, the Christian Brothers College conferred on him the honorary degree of Master of Arts.

Dr. McKinney studied laryngology in Berlin under Professor Fraenkel and practiced this specialty all his life in his home-city. He was a staff member of the Memphis Eye, Ear, Nose and Throat Hospital and of the Baptist Memorial and Memphis General Hospitals, retaining his positions until his retirement from medical practice a few years ago. His position of greatest importance was his Professorship of Otolaryngology in the College of Medicine of the University of Tennessee. Besides his membership in the local county society, the Tennessee State Medical Society and the American Medical Association, he was a member of the American Academy of Ophthalmology and Otolaryngology and a Fellow of the American Laryngological, Rhinological and Otological Society, of the American Bronchoscopic Society, of which he was President in 1933, and an Active Fellow of the American Laryngological Association, having been first elected an Associate Fellow in 1923.

His chief secular interest was golf, and at the time of his death he was President of the Memphis Country Club, where, in recent years, he had made his home. He was married in 1917 to Eleanor Hack, of Emmitsburg, Maryland. There were no children.

Of the list of scientific publications given in his biographical questionnaire, and there were probably many more unlisted, the greatest number of the thirty deal with laryngological subjects, which appear to have held his chief interest.



# HERBERT STANLEY BIRKETT 1864-1942

Canadian Laryngology lost its beloved pioneer and dean when Herbert Stanley Birkett died on July 19, 1942. He had lived a complete life but his passing left his confreres, patients, friends, and family unreconciled to the loss. He was one of the first thoroughly trained Canadian Laryngologists having studied under the leading Laryngologists of the day, Chiari, von Schroetter, and Schnitzler in Austria; Fraenkel, Kraus and Killian in Germany; Fauvell in Paris; and Greville MacDonald, Bond, and Morell MacKenzie in England.

He was deeply interested in the beginnings of laryngology and Garcia's picture was in a prominent position in his consulting rooms. When invited to deliver the Semon Lecture by the University of London in 1922 the title of his lecture was "The Transatlantic Development of Rhino-Laryngology." He stressed the many important and original contributions of American Laryngologists to the specialty. He was a complete master of the indirect technique of laryngoscopic examination and operation. He was as much at home in this as with the more simple direct technique. He was the first in Canada to perform thyrotomy for malignant disease of the larynx in 1893. He was always a strong supporter of his friends St. Clair Thomson and Chevalier Jackson in their advocacy of thyrotomy for selected cases of early malignancy as against laryngectomy. He had many successful thyrotomies where the patient survived the five year period after operation. It was he who introduced bronchoscopy to Canada in 1906.

Dr. Birkett was always justly proud of the fact that he had been nominated for membership in the Laryngological Association in 1893 by his devoted friend, Dr. Bryson Delavan. I can understand the depth of his pride because I had the equally good fortune to be nominated to this society by Dr. Birkett himself. He became vice-president of the Association in 1898, and had the distinction of being its presi-

dent in 1907. There was scarcely a month went by through all the years that Dr. Birkett and Dr. Delavan did not correspond. They held for each other the warmest regard and highest admiration. He felt Dr. Delavan's death in June very keenly, and he regretted that he was not well enough to attend the funeral. He did not realize that they were so shortly to be reunited—only a month later.

Dr. Birkett was born in Hamilton, Ontario, in 1864. He was proud of his birth place but he actually spent very little time in it because he took his early education in England. On returning to Canada he was an accomplished musician and held the post of organist in St. Georges Church, Montreal, while he carried off the highest honors in the Medical Faculty of McGill, graduating in 1886 as the Holmes Gold Medalist.

When he returned to Montreal to practice otolaryngology he immediately joined the Department of Anatomy, McGill University, as a demonstrator and maintained this connection for ten years, laying the ground work for his skilful operative technique. He was appointed director of the Department of Laryngology at the Montreal General Hospital in 1890, and in 1898 he organized the first Laryngological Service at the Royal Victoria Hospital and was its director till he retired as a consultant in 1930. In addition he was an active member of the medical staffs and consultant to the following hospitals: The Alexandria Hospital for Infectious Diseases, the Children's Memorial Hospital, the Montreal Foundling and Baby Hospital. He was Otolaryngologist to the MacKay Institute for the Deaf, and latterly had been president and honorary president of the Institute. He was a Life-Governor of the Montreal General Hospital from 1887.

He enjoyed a unique distinction in the Medical Faculty of McGill University. He was for thirty-five years a full professor and Departmental director first, in Laryngology and Rhinology, and later in Otolaryngology. How young he was when he first assumed this high rank may best be illustrated by a story which he was fond of telling on himself and his dear friends, the late Dr. Fred Finley and Dr. Jack McCarthy. One Hallowe'en night when walking home from a faculty meeting they passed the home of Sir William Peterson, the

Principal of the University. They conceived the bright idea of standing a log up against the Principal's door. In the morning when the door was opened in addition to the log, there was Dr. Finley's umbrella with his name on it. Those who had the privilege of knowing both Dr. Finley and Dr. Birkett will best enjoy this story.

He was greatly interested in the teaching of graduate and post-graduate students, and he was invited to lecture to the British Medical Association in 1912 on the standards of special education. He was McGill Medical Librarian and in 1914 he was chosen as Dean of the Medical Faculty of McGill University. In recognition of his distinguished service to King and Country he was awarded an Honorary L.L.D. degree at the McGill Centenary celebration in 1921.

He concerned himself with every aspect of his housemen's lives. He usually breakfasted with them in order that they could more readily discuss their problems with him. His advice and his library were ever at their disposal. He never failed to emphasize the importance of the bedside examination before undertaking laboratory tests. He advocated a thorough knowledge of general medicine and surgery before entering any specialty and he provided facilities for study of the basic sciences in his own specialty. His housemen were his frequent guests at intercollegiate football games on Saturday afternoons, and his home was open house every Sunday afternoon to students and friends.

He held outstanding positions in the Medical Societies of the world. For many years he served as secretary and later as vice-president of the Canadian Medical Association finally becoming a Senior Member in 1936. He was president of Montreal Medico-Chirurgical Society in 1903. He was four times vice-president of the Section of Laryngology and Otology of the British Medical Association. He was honorary president of the Clinical Congress of Laryngology in London in 1919 and in the same year he was vice-president of the Otological Section of the Royal Society of Medicine. He was a member of the American Bronchoscopic and Oesophagological Society and of the International Collegium of Otolaryngology. He was a fellow of the American College of Surgeons and of the Royal College of Surgeons of Canada. In 1913 he was vice-president of the Otological section of the International Congress of Medicine.

He was president of the American Laryngological, Rhinological, and Otological Society in 1919, and president of the American Otological Society in 1922. In 1927 he was the first Member to be the guest of Honor of the American Academy of Ophthalmology and Otolaryngology. He was the founder and first Chairman of the Otolaryngological Section of the Montreal Medico-Chirurgical Society in 1933. In 1935 and 1938 he was the vice-president of the Pan-American Congress. In 1936 he was the representative of the Dominion of Canada at the International Congress of Otolaryngology in Berlin. He was an Honorary Member of the Scottish, Italian, and German Otolaryngological Societies.

General Birkett's military career was outstanding. He joined the Third Victoria Rifles of Canada in 1887 and later studied at Aldershot, England. He organized the first fully qualified regimental stretcher section in Canada. He laid the foundations for the present Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps, of which he was appointed Honorary Colonel at the outbreak of the present war.

In the great war he organized and commanded the first University Hospital to take the Field, No. 3 Canadian General Hospital (McGill). While in France he became Assistant Director-General, Canadian Army Medical Services Overseas with the rank of Brigadier General. He was created Companion of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath (Military) and was twice mentioned in Dispatches by Sir Douglas Haig. He was Honorary Physician and Aide-de-Camp to the Governors General of Canada, Lord Byng of Vimy and Viscount Willingdon.

Dr. Birkett was a sound clinician with an intimate knowledge of pharmacology and a skilled surgeon with good judgment. He was a cultured gentleman who charmed all who came within his circle. His spell was that of the true Christian Physician—sympathetic understanding and gentle skill for all who placed themselves under his care.

He might be called the world's most travelled otolaryngologist because there was not a year went by that he did not visit the world's outstanding clinics in search of knowledge in his field of medicine. At least two months of every year were given over to travel. On returning home he was prepared for a hard winter's work with very few interruptions. He was a good citizen with a keen sense of community responsibility. He carried out an active but restricted round of social duties. He lived simply but was a liberal host.

Dr. Birkett had little personal experience with illness. He enjoyed extraordinarily good health. All his energies were devoted to his profession. He frequently commented to me about the great debt he owed to his wife for having assumed full responsibility for all business and financial matters through the years. He boasted that his bank would scarcely recognize his signature.

He enjoyed the unselfish devotion of his family throughout his last long illness of 18 months. He had a reputation for never having missed the funeral of a friend and he himself had one of the most impressive and touching of funerals.

His own life well illustrates a passage of James Russell Lowell's which he quoted in his biography of Lefferts.

"The longer on this earth we live
And weigh the various qualities of men,
The more we feel the high, stern featured beauty
Of plain devotedness to duty.
Steadfast and still, nor paid with mortal praise,
But finding ample recompense
For life's ungarlanded expense
In work done squarely and unwasted days."

## ROBERT EMMETT BUCKLEY, M.D. 1888-1942

Robert Emmett Buckley, one of our most loved and respected members, died on July 25, 1942, at the Roosevelt Hospital, New York City.

Dr. Buckley, born in New Britain, Connecticut, on December 14th, 1888, was educated in the public schools there before matriculating at Yale University from which he received the M. D. degree in 1911. While at Yale he was a member of Nu Sigma Nu and chairman of his class day committee. Interneship was served at St. Mary's in Brooklyn, New York from 1911 to 1913.

From that date Dr. Buckley was associated with Manhattan Eye, Ear and Throat Hospital until he joined the Roosevelt Hospital Unit in 1917. He served with the Sixth Engineers until July 29, 1918 at which time he became physician in charge of the Nose and Throat Department at Base Hospital 15, Chaumont, France, remaining in this position until March 13, 1919. Dr. Buckley received his Captaincy on February 28, 1919. His total period of overseas service extended from July 2, 1917 to March 18, 1919.

Upon returning to this country, Dr. Buckley again served at Manhattan Eye, Ear and Throat Hospital until 1926 when he became Professor of Otolaryngology at New York Post Graduate Medical School and Hospital. He remained at this post until recalled by Manhattan Eye, Ear and Throat Hospital after the death of Dr. John E. MacKenty in 1931. During this period of association, Dr. Buckley simplified Dr. MacKenty's method of laryngectomy, and improved the artificial larynx.

Besides being an authority in laryngology, Dr. Buckley was a master of surgery of the nasal accessory sinuses, cleft palate, hare lip and osteomyelitis of the skull.

He was an ingenious operator, with untold patience, never raising his voice in an operating room, and it was always a pleasure to work with him. He was not only willing but anxious to help the younger men, having spent hour after hour, year after year, teaching them in the operating and dissecting rooms.

In addition to his service at Manhattan Eye, Ear and Throat Hospital, Dr. Buckley was Consultant Laryngologist to Misericordia Hospital, Consultant Otolaryngologist at Roosevelt Hospital, New York City, St. Luke's Hospital, Newburgh, New York, and Yonkers Professional Hospital, Yonkers, New York.

He was a member of the New York Laryngological Society, New York Otolaryngological Society, New York State and County Medical Society, Academy of Medicine, Academy of Ophthalmology and Otolaryngology, American Medical Association, American Laryngological Society, American Laryngological, Rhinological and Otological Society. Dr. Buckley was former President of the New York Laryngological Society and New York Otolaryngological Society, being one of the founder members of the latter. He was Vice President of the Association of the Yale Alumni in Medicine during 1936-1937.

Dr. Buckley was an ardent golfer and fond of riding and fishing, but, as all who knew him will remember, his greatest hobby was his farm at Farmingdale, New Jersey, where he spent every summer.

Dr. Buckley leaves a widow, the former Madge Muir, two daughters, Phyllis and Barbara, and two sisters.


## ENRIQUE FERNANDEZ SOTO 1883-1942

Dr. Soto, elected a Corresponding Fellow of the American Laryngological Association in 1940, passed away at his home in Havana, Cuba, on August 18, 1942. He is characterized by Dr. C. L. Jackson, who knew him well, as the "Dean of Cuban laryngologists" and "one of the foremost laryngologists in the world." Quiet, modest and unassuming, he was unknown to many of our fellows, although he had attended one or two meetings of our Association. Shortly after his death, a memorial pamphlet was published by his friends and colleagues in Cuba listing his accomplishments.

Born in Trinidad, a province of Santa Clara, Cuba, of Cuban parentage, on February 1, 1883, he passed the first eleven years of his life there attending local schools, and then in 1894 went to Spain to complete his education, remaining until 1905. During this time, he studied first at Calahorra, where he attained his bachelor's degree, then the University of Santiago of Compostela, and, following that, attended the Universidad Central de Espana, Facultad de Medicina, where he was graduated as a Licentiate in Medicine and Surgery on June 29, 1905. The following year he became Doctor in Medicine and Surgery at the Universidad de la Habana, and served as interne in Medicine in the Princesa Hospital. In 1908 and 1909 he was Assistant in Surgery and in 1910 to 1916 Laryngologist to the Sanatarium of Cavadonga (Havana).

At the age of 27, he studied laryngology under Luc, Castex and Guizes in Paris, and, later still studied broncho-esophagoscopy under the Jacksons in America. He served in the outpatient departments of the Sanatorio Covadonga and Mercedes Hospitals in Havana and became Chief of the Ear, Nose and Throat Department to the former and Laryngologist to the latter, and was, at the time of his death, on the staff of the Anglo-American Hospital. In 1917 and 1918 he had been Consultant in laryngology to the Hospital of our Lady of Mercy (Havana).

Active in medical affairs in Cuba, he was appointed in 1922 by the Cuban Government, a delegate to the International Congress in



Paris, and was a member of the fourth and fifth National Medical Congress (Havana) in 1912 and 1922. In 1924 he was elected to membership in the Academy of Medical Sciences of Havana, a Corresponding member of the Societe Francaise de Oto-Rhino-Laryngologie in 1921, a fellow of the American College of Surgeons in 1926, Honorary member of the Sociedad Otorhino-laryngologica de Madrilena (Madrid) and in 1938 was President of the Cuban Society of Oto-Rhino-Laryngology. He was a life member of the American Hospital Association. Among his interests was the work of the Institute del Cancer of Havana.

Dr. Soto was a member of the Roman Catholic Church. He had little interest in politics, but much in golf, fishing and, to an extent, in yachting. He belonged to the Country Club, the Jaimanitas of Havana and to the Yacht Club. His contributions to medical literature numbered nineteen, over a well diversified range of subjects, all published either in Madrid or Havana journals.

He is survived by his widow, the former Eva Rodriguez Adan, of Camaguey, Cuba.



## CURTIS CLYDE EVES 1875-1942

Dr. Curtis Clyde Eves was born in Millville, Pennsylvania, on October 12, 1875, and died at the Pennsylvania Hospital in Philadelphia on September 22, 1942, following a total gastrectomy for advanced gastric malignancy. Although it was evident that he was failing in health for some time, he characteristically made so little complaint that his friends and even his family for a long time were unaware of the seriousness of his condition.

Dr. Eves' father was Joseph E. Eves, a manufacturer and one time postmaster at Millville, Pennsylvania, and his mother was Charlotte A. Heacock. Both his parents were born in Millville. Dr. Eves was a birthright Hicksite Friend and throughout his life retained his membership in the Millville, Pennsylvania, Meeting. His religious upbringing and his continued connection with the Hicksite Friends Meeting greatly influenced his whole life. His early life was spent at Millville, for several years clerking at a grocery store of that town, and attending the Greenwood Seminary from which he graduated to enter the George School in Bucks County, a Hicksite Friends Boarding School. His interest in the George School continued throughout his life and for many years he served as one of its trus-Because of his active interest in physical education he was elected physical director of the George School where he served for a number of years and it was probably this position that enabled him to attain his medical education.

He spent two years in the University of Vermont before coming to Philadelphia to enter the Medicochirurgical College where he graduated in 1905. He interned at the Episcopal Hospital in Philadelphia and after his internship in this hospital he immediately took up the study of otolaryngology, going to the New York Eye and Ear Infirmary where he was resident for two years. Later on, in 1926, he spent some time studying in Vienna.

On returning to Philadelphia after his residency at the New York Eye and Ear Infirmary, he was elected chief of otolaryngology at the Episcopal Hospital, which position he held until 1915 when he resigned. He married Glodean Smith in Philadelphia on October 16, 1915.

Through his early association with Dr. Francis R. Packard he became assistant in the Otolaryngological Departments of the Pennsylvania Hospital and the Bryn Mawr Hospital in 1909 and on the retirement of Dr. Packard in 1931 he was elected chief of these services in both hospitals. He retired from active hospital work in 1937 and was appointed consulting otolaryngologist to the Pennsylvania and Bryn Mawr Hospitals.

He was elected to active fellowship in the American Laryngological Association in 1935. He was also a member of the American Otological Society; American Broncho-Esophagological Society; American Laryngological, Rhinological and Otological Society; American Academy of Ophthalmology and Otological Society; and the American Medical Association. As a Fellow of the College of Physicians of Philadelphia he was very active in the work of the Section on Otologyngology, being chairman in 1937 and 1938, and serving on its Executive Committee up to the time of his death.

Dr. Eves was essentially a clinician and became one of Philadelphia's most successful and efficient practitioners of otolaryngology. While not radically inclined, he was an exceedingly skillful operator, thoroughly cognizant of the progressive improvements in the diagnosis of otolaryngological disease and in the technique of its treatment. Not only did he possess an uncanny ability in estimating the value of new and progressive ideas but he had initiative. Before the days of Jackson in Philadelphia he was one of the few Philadelphians who really practiced bronchoscopy and was among the first of those who used local anesthesia in tonsillectomy. Although he was not a prolific writer, his published articles were real contributions to our specialty. He published the technique of his method of tonsillectomy in 1912 and wrote on the removal of foreign bodies by direct bronchoscopy and esophagoscopy in 1917. Other important articles concerned lateral sinus thrombosis and suppuration of the petrous pyramid.

He was fortunate in being associated with Dr. Packard so early in his career but it was his own ability that established his success.

He was industrious, with an exceptionally pleasing personality, and thoroughly ethical with an unusual sense of responsibility for the welfare of his patients and his professional obligations.

In his vacational periods he turned to the out of doors. He was an enthusiastic fisherman and a skillful one, and a large part of his vacations were spent on the salmon streams of Canada. For the last few years he was a member of the Swiftwater Preserve, a trout club in the Poconos. He also enjoyed and played a good game of golf and was a member of the Doctors' Golf Association of Philadelphia. He was a member of the Union League and also of the Philadelphia Country Club.

Although Dr. Eves did not take a very active part in our meetings, he was an almost constant attendant at our annual sessions and understood and appreciated the honor and privilege of fellowship in the Association. His kindly smile, his friendly greetings, his sympathetic friendship will make the wound of his passing a difficult one to heal. He was a gentleman unafraid, an accomplished physician, a loyal friend.

## JOSEPH C. BECK 1870-1942

Dr. Joseph C. Beck, Active Fellow of the American Larvngological Association since 1926, died at his Chicago home on October 20, 1942, after a long illness. He was born September 26, 1870 at Debrish, Bohemia, his parents having been Ignatz and Louise Pollock Beck, both of Czecho-Slovakia. It was here that he spent his early boyhood days and received his early education. Coming to America at the age of twelve, he lived with relatives at Holden, near St. Louis, Missouri, attending public schools and a convent school. In 1895 he graduated in medicine from the College of Physicians and Surgeons, of Chicago, now the Medical Department of the University of Illinois. He served a term as interne in the Cook County Hospital and in 1898 studied laryngology in the University of Prague, near his old home, under Prof. Zaufal. As he grew in knowledge and reputation, he served in the dispensaries and house staffs of the University of Illinois, the Illinois Charitable Eye and Ear Infirmary, the University Hospital, the Cook County, North Chicago, Michael, Reese, Henrotin, Mt. Sinai, and the Hines U. S. Veterans Hospitals and became Associate Professor of Otolaryngology in the Medical Department of the University of Illinois. He became Emeritus in 1932. He was Consultant in Otolaryngology to the Veterans Administration at Hines, Illinois, from 1927 to 1938.

Dr. Beck had for many years been a member of the Board of Directors of the American Board of Otolaryngology, conducting the examinations in pathology—he was also certified by the Board of Plastic Surgery. He was Chairman of the Section of Laryngology, Otology and Rhinology of the American Medical Association in 1919, was President of the American Laryngological, Rhinological and Otological Society in 1933, President of the American Academy of Ophthalmology and Otolaryngology in 1915 and Honor Guest in 1931 and President of the American Bronchoscopic Society in 1936. He had been President of the Chicago Laryngological Society. He was also a fellow of the American Otological Society, the Society of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery and of the American College of Surgeons. He was Consultant for the Chicago League for the Hard of

Hearing. In 1940 he was appointed Associate Dean of Education at the Illinois Eye & Ear Infirmary.

Dr. Beck's special interests in otolarvngology lay in plastic surgery, pathology and graduate medical education. His Chairman's address before the Section of the American Medical Association in New Orleans in 1919 proposed a well thought out scheme for this type of education, which up to that time could be said to have been only in the embryo stage and portions of his plan have been used in the great developments that have taken place since that time. He was instrumental in forming the Section of Otolaryngological Pathology of the Army War Department Museum in Washington under Lt. Colonel Ash, in urging the building up of the collection of pathological specimens by contributions of material from the country's otolaryngologists and in the preparation of sets of standard microscopic slides to be loaned to students and those preparing themselves for the Board examinations. This was one of his most noteworthy achievements—this and his constant insistance on the importance of pathology to otolaryngologists and in the inclusion of this study in all curricula of graduate instruction. He was in great demand for lectures at state and regional organizations and special courses, and always held his audience, with his practical, plain spoken discourses.

Dr. Beck's military record in World War I can best be given in his own words, taken from a letter to Dr. Delavan of April 29, 1931 as follows:

"Soon after our entry into the war, I was commissioned as Major in the Reserve Corps in the Head Division, with special activity in plastic surgery. I was ordered to give several courses to the prospective plastic surgeons, both in St. Louis and Chicago.

"Owing to a general order, requested by the British, asking that all men, even though American citizens, that were born in enemy territory be temporarily honorably discharged, I having been born in Czecho Slovakia, was discharged.

"I then became Chairman of the Advisory Board in Chicago and served in that capacity until September 1918, when I was recommissioned into the French Division of the Czecho Slovakia newly created Army, and was ordered to take charge of the American Red Cross Hospital, No. 113, located at Cogniac, France. This post, having

some four hundred patients, was under my care until after the Armistice, when I was transferred to Prague (Praha) and advanced in rank to Lt. Colonel.


"By order of the Surgeon General of the Czecho Slovakia Army, I was ordered to take several hundred recovered wounded Italians to their native homes as far as Palermo, Sicily. From here I was ordered to Paris where I was given a commission to organize Interallied Graduate teaching in the United States. Upon my return to the United States I delivered, under the auspices of the New York Academy of Medicine, a lecture outlining the proposition. However, the practice of it never materialized.

"One month later I was honorably discharged from the Czecho Slovakia Army and recommissioned in the Medical Reserve Corps of the United States Army, where I still remain with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel."

One of the popular teachers of otolaryngology in this country, he was possessed of a keen sense of humor, a fund of good stories and a facility in telling them, a hearty laugh and a good memory for names and faces. On the occasions of the Alumni dinners of the Academy, a large group, consisting of former students and trainees, calling themselves Joe Beck's Boys, always gathered to honor their old chief. For an intimate study of "Joe" the reader is referred to his last literary work—a book entitled Fifty Years in Medicine. It is an autobiography for the most part, though some chapters were written by his devoted wife. In it there is much humor, especially the chapter devoted to his ill-starred farming adventure of a few years back. In his younger days, Dr. Beck was a voluminous writer, on many and varied subjects. His list of books includes: Applied Pathology of the Nose, Throat and Ear; Atlas of Radiology of the Ear, Nose and Throat; Stereoscopic Atlas of Plastic Surgery of the Face, Head and Neck (with Dr. Ira Frank); chapters in Loeb's Operative Surgery of the Nose, Throat and Ear, and in many other textbooks.

Dr. Beck is survived by his widow, who was Miss Reka Trendell and by three children by a former marriage; Elsa, a member of the bar, Philip and Joseph C., Jr.

He was a Republican in politics and attended the Peoples Church of Chicago.



#### HENRY HALL FORBES

#### 1868-1942

Dr. Henry Hall Forbes of New York City passed away on October 25, 1942. He was born March 20, 1868 in New Bedford, Mass., and came from a distinguished American ancestry on both his father's and mother's side.

He was justly proud of this ancestry and as a side line to medicine did much for the advancement and fellowship of our patriotic societies, especially the Mayflower society, the Society of Colonial Wars, the Sons of the Revolution, The New England Society and the Military Order of Foreign Wars, in all of which he was an ardent and enthusiastic member.

Dr. Forbes had the privilege of serving in two wars. In 1898 he became an assistant surgeon in the Naval Militia of the State of New York, and served aboard the ironclad Monitor and Nahant. He resigned in 1913 with the rank of Surgeon.

During the World War he served as Major in the U. S. A. Medical Reserve Corps serving eleven months in France as well as in Base Hospitals near Southampton and Liverpool.

Dr. Forbes received a most excellent education at Columbia University followed by an internship at the Presbyterian Hospital in New York City. He then began the study of otolaryngology at the Post Graduate Hospital under the late Dr. Clarence J. Rice and Dr. Thomas J. Harris. This was supplemented by many summers spent in post graduate study in Vienna. He became very well known on the continent through his many contacts, scientific contributions and love for travel.

His medical interests centered very much in bronchoscopy and he made many contributions to the literature and practice of this then new branch of medicine.

An escophagoscope still much in use bears his name. He was a founder and President of the American Broncho Esophagological Society.

During his later years he spent much time and energy in attempting to form an International Society of Bronchoscopy. The present war prevented his efforts from bearing fruit.

During his professional life he had many responsible hospital connections being at some time connected with the Northern Westchester, Fifth Avenue, Lying-in, Grasslands, Post Graduate, Lutheran, French, Trinity, New York, St. Joseph, City, and New York Founding's Hospitals.

He was honored by membership in the American Academy of Ophthalmology and Otolaryngology, American Laryngological, Rhinological and Otological Society, American Broncho-Esophagological Society, the American Laryngological Association and was at one time the Chairman of the Section of the New York State Medical Society. He was Chairman of the Section of Laryngology of the New York Academy of Medicine.

Dr. Forbes published some 32 articles on subjects in his field, many of which were on Bronchoscopy and they interestingly show his influence on the development of this specialty.


While Dr. Forbes was a most active physician, carried on a large practice and a professorship at Post Graduate Hospital he found it possible to give in time and money to many outside activities. He attended many medical meetings both here and abroad and found time to participate in the discussions and contribute to their scientific and political problems. He also found time to participate in many extra curricula activities assumed as a citizen of his community, being active in the Columbia University Club, President of the Quill Club, his Masonic Lodge, for 13 years Surgeon to the Naval and Military Order of the Spanish-American War and perhaps nearest to his heart a Trustee of the Jennie Clarkson Home, the New York Dispensary and the Northern Dispensary.

October 7, 1897, Dr. Forbes married Jenny P. Mack, whom he survived a very short time. They were blessed with two children, John and Rhoda. His home and family were his first thought and those who were privileged to visit his home could not help but feel the charm and spontaneity which was always present. He was a delightful host, spontaneous in his humor and fond of good stories.

Perhaps one of his great charms was his enthusiasm for his chosen work and his interest and pat on the back for the younger man finding his way in medicine and life.

Dr. Delavan once wrote of him "The record of the appointments and activities given to him suggest a life of great activity and varied usefulness. The appointments and honors conferred upon Dr. Forbes were well bestowed. He was particularly dignified in bearing, thorough in the execution of his many duties, excellent in organization and an accomplished and ready speaker. A man of sterling background and of exceptionally fine character. It was not strange that he was fully appreciated by his contemporaries who recognized the justice of well merited honors."

#### THOMAS JEFFERSON HARRIS

#### 1865-1943

Dr. Thomas J. Harris, of New York City, passed away on March 14, 1943 at the age of 77 years. He was born at Claremont, New Hampshire, where he received his secondary education, on July 26, 1865. He came of old New England Puritan stock, one paternal ancestor, Walter Harris, having arrived on the ship William and Francis from England in 1632; another Elder William Brewster on the Mayflower, while a maternal ancestor, Major General Daniel Gookin. arrived in 1633. Entering Dartmouth College, Dr. Harris received his A. B. in 1886 and his A. M. in 1889, the same year that he graduated in medicine from the Medical School of the University of Pennsylvania. A year's internship in the old Blockley, now the Philadelphia General Hospital, was followed by special studies in Berlin under the celebrated Professor Dr. B. Fraenkel, after which he entered the practice of otolaryngology in New York City. Here he became connected with the Manhattan Eye, Ear and Throat Hospital and with the New York Post-graduate Hospital, continuing to serve the latter, in various capacities, until, at the time of his death, he was Consulting Surgeon in Otolaryngology, and in which he had been Adjunct Professor and later Professor of Diseases of the Nose and Throat, from 1903 to 1925. It was here that he developed his great and continuing interest in the graduate teaching of his specialty, which was put to most practical use during the World War No. 1, when he organized and was Surgeon in Charge of the Department of Otolaryngology in General Hospital No. 14, Fort Oglethorpe, Ga., and Director of the School of Otolaryngology at Camp Greenleaf, Ga., with the rank of Lieut, Colonel, M. C., U. S. A. Shortly after the War, he became a Director of the American Board of Otolaryngology, serving usefully until his retirement, due to ill-health and the infirmities of age, as Honorary Director.

Dr. Harris was a Fellow of all of the important national and local organizations pertaining to his specialty. He held office in most of them, especially noteworthy being his Secretaryship of the American Laryngological, Rhinological and Otological Society for many years

(1906-1916) from the early days after its foundation. It was largely due to his enthusiasm, hard work and camaraderie that this organization made rapid strides in growth and importance, until it reached its present-day eminence. He was rewarded for his work by being made President in 1916. At this time he became Secretary-Treasurer of the American Otological Society, President in 1925, and again Secretary-Treasurer until 1939. He became an Active Fellow of the American Laryngological Association in 1903 and was elevated to Honorary Fellowship in 1939. He was a fellow of the American Medical Association, the New York Academy of Medicine, the New York Otological Society (President in 1916); the New York Laryngological Society (which Dr. D. B. Delavan said was the first such society in history) of which he was President in 1932; the New York Physicians Mutual Aid Society (President in 1929) and the American Academy of Ophthalmology and Otolaryngology.


Dr. Harris' philanthropic interests were many as is attested by his active membership in the following organizations: New York Dispensary (Trustee), New York City Baptist Mission Society (Recording Secretary), Baptist Fresh Air Home Society, Jennie Clarkson Home for Children (President in 1922 and for many succeeding years) the Society of Colonial Wars, Sons of the American Revolution and the Theta Delta Chi fraternity.

Walking and the study of history, chiefly local and medical, were his other diversions, and among his more than sixty-five scientific papers, quite a number were on the latter topic, and an equal number on the teaching of otolaryngology. He published in our Transactions ten papers and in his total contributions scarcely any part of the specialty was not covered. Many of his essays dealt wih purely laryngological subjects and about an equal number with otology. His knowledge of his subjects was accurate and extensive, his reading and study up to date and his contributions of value.

Dr. Harris was married in 1896 to Miss Lena Breed, of Lynn, Mass., who survives him, as does a married daughter, Elizabeth Harris Barton. While maintaining an office in New York City, for many years his home was in Scarsdale, until failing health compelled his removal to Tuscon, Arizona. He was a member of the Baptist Church, the University Club of New York City, the Guild Club,

of which he was President in 1907 and he was Historian of the town of Scarsdale. He was an Independent Republican.

"Tom" or "Tommy" Harris, as he liked to be called, had a most engaging personality which endeared him to his colleagues and many friends, especially younger ones, to whom he was always kind and helpful. From his regular attendance at society meetings, he was a familiar and welcome figure to many, always interested in the problems of others and always ready with wise and helpful council. He will be sadly missed.



#### JOHN FINCH BARNHILL

#### 1865-1943

John Finch Barnhill, who passed away on March 10, 1943, at Miami Beach, Florida, was born January 2, 1865, near the town of Flora, Illinois. A few years later, his family moved to the State of Missouri where they remained only a short time, coming then to the State of Indiana, where their young son entered the common schools of that state. For many years John F. Barnhill was a citizen of Indiana, completing his common school education, attending Union High School of Westfield, Indiana and graduating from Central Normal College at Danville, Indiana. After teaching school a few years he decided to study medicine, later graduating from the Central College of Physicians and Surgeons, located at Indianapolis, Indiana, now affiliated with the Indiana University School of Medicine. Upon graduation he served his internship (1888-89) at the City Dispensary in Indianapolis, later becoming associated with Dr. Joseph Eastman at the Eastman Sanitarium, and still later with Dr. Robert W. Long of Indianapolis.

In 1895-96 he took a post-graduate course at the New York Eye and Ear Infirmary in New York City. During the year 1896-97 he studied at the Central London Ear, Nose and Throat Hospital, London, England. In 1899-1900 he had a private course with Jensen at Berlin, Germany; 1900-01 he studied at the Politzer Clinic in Vienna, Austria. Later he made short visits to American and European clinics.

During the first few years after his graduation from medical school (1889-96) he engaged in the practice of general medicine, but after his studies in this country and abroad, he limited himself to the practice of otolaryngology and surgery of the head and neck (approximate period 1889-1939), Indianapolis, Ind.

#### TEACHING CAREER

His career as a teacher ran parallel with his career as a surgeon. In his early life he taught in the public schools of Indiana, during the years 1882-3-4-5-6. Subsequently he held many teaching posi-

tions in medical schools, culminating in the Professorships of Otolaryngology and Surgery of the Head and Neck in Indiana University.


#### HOBBIES

# SIR ST. CLAIR THOMSON 1859-1943

Sir St. Clair Thomson, that grand old man of British laryngology, is no longer with us. The news of his death was received with deep regret by his numerous friends and admirers on both sides of the Atlantic. Two years ago he came to Scotland after his house in London was partly destroyed by enemy action. At first he went to his native Argyllshire, but that, as he remarked to the writer, was "far too quiet for a young fellow of eighty-three." So he made his home in Edinburgh, and it was in Princes Street that he was knocked down by a motor cyclist on the morning of January 18 and sustained injuries which led to his death a fortnight later.

Sir St. Clair was proud of his Scottish ancestry and of his Celtic parents. He would relate how his mother, who lived to the age of 91 spoke Gaelic, and he always held that the most important years of his education were those during which he attended the village school of Ardrishaig, with the sons and daughters of the Loch Fyne fishermen. Completing his schooling at Peterborough, he took his medical training at King's College, London, and at the end of it, he had the good fortune to be appointed house surgeon to Lord Lister, then at the height of his fame though still facing bitter opposition. Sir St. Clair loved to recall those days, and only a few months ago he delivered, in his own inimitable fashion, a delightful lecture on "A House Surgeon's Memories of Lister" to the Medical Society of Edinburgh University.

After two years spent in travel and in study at the Clinics of France and Germany, including those of Schrötter, Hajek, and Politzer at Vienna, he settled in London in 1893, while laryngology was still an infant among the specialities. He was appointed to the Throat Hospital (Golden Square) and later to King's College Hospital, and he made a valuable contribution to medicine by his researches on nasal infections. Unfortunately the hard work took its toll, for he developed tuberculosis and was destined to spend about a year in a sanatorium. As the larynx was also affected, he was obliged to maintain strict silence for six months. Fortunately he made

a complete recovery and he lived to become the leading authority on laryngeal tuberculosis. Only a few weeks before his death his characteristic kindness and sympathy led him to visit a young doctor in a sanatorium near Edinburgh: "Not that I can do much for him," he remarked, "but perhaps if I tell him my own experience I'll cheer him up."

It was during this temporary check to his career that Sir St. Clair lost his wife, after only four years of marriage.

Once more at work, Sir St. Clair Thomson was summoned to attend King Edward VII during his last illness, and later, he had other Royal patients. Such distinction was well deserved, as he had by that time proved his merit by the publication of a large work on "Diseases of the Nose and Throat" which at once became the leading text book and is still regarded as "The Laryngologist's Bible."

Many honours came to Sir St. Clair in his time. He was knighted in 1912 and became Officer de la Legion d'Honneur, Officer de l'Ordre de Leopold, and Commendatore della Corona d'Italia. On three occasions he was President of the Section of Otolaryngology of the British Medical Association. He also served as President of the Tuberculosis Association and as President of the Visiting Association of Throat and Ear Surgeons.

In 1925 he was elected President of the Royal Society of Medicine and, to mark this high honour and to signify their esteem, 175 of his colleagues presented him with a silver loving cup. This esteem was again manifest when, in 1932, the members of the Section of Laryngology presented him with his portrait.


Sir St. Clair was well known in the United States and in Canada, He used to say that each of his visits to America was a lively tonic. He had a warm regard for his American colleagues and that this regard was mutual was shown by his election in 1914 to the Honorary Fellowship of the American Laryngological Association, a distinction which he highly prized, calling it "the blue ribbon of American laryngology."

That Sir St. Clair Thomson was a skilful surgeon must be admitted by all who were privileged to see him perform laryngo-fissure for cancer of the larynx, an operation which he had brought to a high stage of perfection. He always held that in early cases it was greatly preferable to radium implantation.


No appreciation of the life work of Sir St. Clair would be complete without some reference to the man himself. His wide human sympathy, his charm of manner, his generous hospitality and his numerous artistic and literary interests drew to him many friends in many countries. Whenever there was a Larvngological meeting or Medical Congress in London, the door of his hospitable home in Wimpole Street was widely opened. He loved to entertain his friends, home and foreign, new and old, junior and senior, and to show them with pardonable pride, his lovely collection of bric-a-brac, of colour prints and of Majolica jars. A keen lover of music, of drama, and of literature, he had a well stored mind and was the most charming of hosts. As an after dinner speaker he was unrivalled, and he could express himself with equal fluency in English, French, or Italian. He was well versed in Shakespeare and had a quotation ready for any occasion. Among other writers his favourite was Robert Louis Stevenson and since his arrival in Edinburgh he had re-visited the haunts of R. L. S. and had restudied the Californian epoch—"Across the Plains" and "The Silverado Squatters"—with keen appreciation. Perhaps he had a fellow feeling for Stevenson, who in his day faced exile and tuberculosis with such noble courage.

In this good company, Sir St. Clair, we, your friends and colleagues, do bid you farewell.

#### EXECUTIVE SESSIONS

In view of the heavy demands upon the time and energies of the Fellows and in order to conserve the transportation facilities of the country in pursuit of the war, the Council voted to omit the Annual Meeting of the Association.

Accordingly the business was transacted by the Council at its Annual Meeting in January, at its second meeting in June and by the Fellowship through a mail ballot February 15.

A summary of these meetings, together with the result of the mail ballot and the reports of Officers and Committees, follows:

#### THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE COUNCIL

The Annual Meeting of the Council was held on January 9, 1943 at the home of the President in New York City. The Secretary, the Treasurer and the Biographer and Historian made interim reports.

The Council made its recommendation for election to the various Fellowships of the Association as detailed below.

The Council discussed at length the advisability of holding a meeting of the Association in 1943. The difficulties of transportation, the demands of local hospitals and practices upon the Fellows and the possibility of producing a program valuable to the war effort were discussed. As a result of its deliberations the Council voted to omit the Annual Meeting in 1943.

The Secretary was directed to prepare a mail ballot on the Candidates recommended for Fellowship to take the place of the balloting customarily held at the Spring Meeting.

The President announced the gift to the Association of early laryngeal instruments collected by Dr. D. Bryson Delavan. The instruments were presented by Dr. Delavan's daughter, Mrs. William B. Moore, and the collection will be housed and displayed by the New York Academy of Medicine.

Plans were discussed for the publication of the Transactions intended to obviate the delay occasioned by the present arrangement.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE NEWCOMB AWARD

The Committee after preliminary discussion and votes by mail met in Chicago at the time of the Faculty Luncheon and unanimously decided to award the honor this year to Dr. George M. Coates.

The Sixty-fourth Annual Congress of the Association was held at the Marlborough-Blenheim Hotel, Atlantic City, N. J., on May 25, 26, and 27, 1942 under the Presidency of Dr. Thomas E. Carmody. There were 73 Fellows and 34 Guests present.

The Casselberry Prize was not given.

The Council has amended the regulations governing the Casselberry Prize to eliminate the requirement of anonymity and also to permit for consideration material previously published, provided that it is original with the author. The Committee will continue to be known only to the Council.

The Sixty-Fourth Volume of the Transactions has been printed and distributed. The demand for copies of the book from non-members and libraries was active. This Volume suffered the usual delay occasioned by holding publication until plates furnished gratuitously by the various journals could be released. Plans are under way at

this time to obviate this delay in future by a new arrangement with the authors and the journals.

The Secretary suggests and strongly urges that a volume be issued this year to take the place of the Transactions, containing an index of subjects and an index of authors to cover all the Transactions from Volume 1 to the present time. This will prove to be in effect an index to American laryngology and should be an invaluable addition to any medical library. He recommends that there be included also the Roster of the Association, the Reports of the Council Meetings, Memorials and the usual statistical material.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CONTROL OF CANCER

Although the present Great War has almost completely eliminated research in various European centers, England and Sweden excepted, considerable work of interest is being done in the United States. Reports from England indicate that the war has disrupted and almost nullified completely the work of years, just when tangible results were being obtained. Fewer patients have presented themselves for treatment, and early cases are rarely seen, whereas in the years immediately preceding the conflict, there had been an increasing number of early cases. This can be attributed to the interference with the usual means of travel and communication in a country so greatly

disturbed by the war. Repeated bombings have resulted in the storage of radium for the duration, so that radium is no longer available for the conditions which react favorably to its use.

The Refrigeration Treatment, or Cryotherapy, has proven of no value, and has been abandoned. Of particular interest is the radio-activation of various substances by exposure to the cyclotron. At the University of California, physicists, biologists, and medical men are using artificially induced radioactive substances in the treatment of cancer. The most potent product of this research is represented by the neutron rays, new particles produced in the cyclotron by the bombardment of beryllium. These rays have the property of penetrating tissue deeply, much like the high voltage Roentgen ray. The biological effects differ considerably from those of x-ray or radium. Clinical trials in advanced and incurable cancers have been favorable enough to indicate that further research should be carried out.

Other fields of activity are represented by the influence of vitamins of the B group, and the effects of various hormones on cancer.

All scientific research will be greatly augmented as a result of the war. It is hoped that cancer will benefit by a share of it.

#### REPORT OF THE DE ROALDES PRIZE COMMITTEE

Acting at the behest of the Council and under the rulings established at the 1941 Annual Meeting (1941 Transactions p. 271-4), the de Roaldes Award Committee of five Fellows has asked the members of the Association to express their opinions in a mail vote, the results have been carefully tabulated, the qualifications of the leading candidates have been exhaustively reviewed by each member and the committee submits herewith its conclusions. We have sought "that individual in the Americas, who, by his outstanding accomplishments and contributions in the field of Rhinology and Laryngology, is recognized as worthy of this especial honor." The final unanimous choice of the committee for this highest honor is Ralph Albert Fenton.

It is interesting that the first three recipients (Drs. Jackson, Delavan and Mosher) should be from the Atlantic Seaboard, the fourth (Dr. Dean) from the Mississippi Basin and the fifth from the Pacific Coast. Dr. Fenton belongs to our great Northwest. He was born in Lafayette, Oregon and has spent most of his life in that state. After four years in Portland Academy and two collegiate years at the University of California, he went to the University of Oregon where he received the degree of Bachelor of Arts in 1903. Next he entered Northwestern University Medical School in Chicago, receiving his medical degree in 1906. Beginning his otolaryngology under the careful tutelage of Dr. Casselberry, he carried it forward as an interne at the Illinois Charitable Eye and Ear Infirmary (1906-1907). Then he returned to Portland to practice his chosen specialty, including ophthalmology but emphasizing otolaryngology. Here his organizing ability, his sane judgment and skill, his capacity for research, and his aptitude for teaching, gradually forced him into his present position of eminence.

As a writer he has emphasized the neurology and physiology of the nose and paranasal sinuses. A review of the bibliography

of forty-five scientific contributions shows his early interest in nasal complications from swimming. By 1928 his happy association with Prof. O. Larsell began to bear fruit, resulting in fourteen articles devoted to constructive research. These and allied investigations lead to his reports on nerve paths and neuralgias, on experimental sinusitis and operative cures, on drug and vaccine therapy and immunity, and how the defensive mechanism was built up. Finally he turned his attention to the protection offered by the lining membrane of the sinuses. Here he reported on reticulo-endothelial components, on histiocytes in acute and chronic sinusitis, and on mucosal responses to experimentally induced sinus pathology. The effects of the commonly used drugs in nasal therapy were included. With Dr. Olof Larsell, he received the Casselberry Prize in 1928 for research on the sphenopalatine ganglion. In between this continuing research he wrote on his experiences with cancer and bone tumors, with larvngeal tissue changes and with bronchoscopic infections. Two papers discussed the sulfa-drugs. One reported on the management of the Oregon Clinic. Thus the practical was richly interspersed with the theoretical.

As an organizer and administrator, Dr. Fenton has shown outstanding ability. He was one of the organizers of U. S. Army Base Hospital number forty-six with which he went to France in 1917. He was attending surgeon at Langres. He was promoted to Major, and later became Colonel in the U. S. Army Reserve. Other significant contributions have been his leadership in the Pacific Coast Oto-Ophthalmological Society; his professorship in otolaryngology at the University of Oregon; his editorship of the Archives of Otolaryngology and the Annals of Otology, Rhinology and Laryngology; his membership on the American Board of Otolaryngology; and his trusteeship of the American Medical Association. In each and all, he has served with distinction.

Dr. Fenton has attained eminence in yet other fields of endeavor. He is an authority on mountain flora. He is a facile linguist. His broad scholarship includes an intimate knowledge of the history of our Pacific northwest. He has just received the honorary degree of Doctor of Science from the University of Oregon, for outstanding achievement.

Organizer, editor, research worker, teacher, scholar, lover of our high mountains, leader in laryngology in the Pacific Northwest, the committee recommends that the de Roaldes Award be given to Dr. Ralph Albert Fenton.

The Committee feels that about all the Society can accomplish in connection with Teaching Procedures in Otolaryngology is for each member to actively interest himself in the teaching of Otolaryngology in his own and neighboring hospitals and in his own medical school, inform himself of the efficiency of such teaching and make practical suggestions to such hospitals and to his medical school for changes in the teaching, where there are changes needed.

Dr. Wherry's basic idea was that the members of this Society should take the lead in advising necessary changes.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON POST WAR REHABILITATION IN RHINOLOGY, LARYNGOLOGY, AND SPEECH DEFECTS

As this Committee reported last year, Post War Rehabilitation in Rhinology, Laryngology and Speech Defects, comes under the Bureau of Veterans' Administration and no provision had been made at that time for such medical care of soldiers needing it because no legislative provision had been made for funds.

A recent letter to the Bureau of Veterans' Administration asking for information on this matter has not yet been answered. Based on work done at Cape May during the first war, Dr. Berry of the Committee representing the Society has a detailed schedule for the rehabilitation of deafened soldiers and the personnel to carry it out already compiled.

The Government has been informed of this, should it care to use it.

#### THE SPECIAL FUNDS AND AWARDS

OF THE

### AMERICAN LARYNGOLOGICAL ASSOCIATION

#### THE JOHNSTON FUND

A legacy of \$5000 was received by the Association on May 21, 1926 from the estate of Dr. Samuel Johnston, President of the Association in 1899. The Fund was not restricted by the will to a specific purpose.

Accordingly in 1941 the Association directed:

That the object of this Fund shall be that when necessary, sums shall be expended from it to assist in the carrying on of the activities of the Association,

That the Fund be maintained as near its original sum of \$5000 as possible, that it shall not be depleted below \$2000 except in extreme emergencies and then with the understanding that a replacement be made at the earliest possible time,

That under ordinary circumstances only the earnings then available shall be expended, and

That at the end of each calendar year the Treasurer may be instructed by the Council to deposit in this Fund a sum of money commensurate with the balance in the treasury, the budget for the coming year and other circumstances.

#### THE JAMES E. NEWCOMB TRUST FUND

A legacy of \$2500 was received from the Estate of Elizabeth W. Newcomb, in memory of Dr. James E. Newcomb, Secretary of the Association from 1900 to 1910 and President in 1911, designating \$2000 to be applied as a Trust Fund to maintain the Archives of the Association, and \$500 to be used for the maintenance of an Award. The first has been designated by the Association as the "James E. Newcomb Trust Fund" and the second maintains the "James E. Newcomb Award."

Expenditures from this Fund are made by the Treasurer at the direction of the Council.

The James E. Newcomb Award is made annually to a member of the American Laryngological Association for scientific attainment in rhinology and laryngology, or as a mark of esteem and appreciation for services to the Association.

The recipient of this Award is selected by a committee of three Fellows who are appointed annually by the President and who may not be members of the Council. The Award consists of a certificate signed by the President, Secretary and Historian and is presented at the Annual Meeting of the Association.

#### THE MEMORIAL FUND

The Memorial Fund, consisting of gifts and bequests to the Association, is administered by a committee known as the "Memorial Fund Committee." It consists of five Fellows appointed by the Council. One member is appointed each year to serve for five years. No member may be appointed to succeed himself.

#### THE DEROALDES AWARD

In 1907 Dr. A. W. deRoaldes donated the sum of \$500 for a prize to be given for the best essay on subjects relating to rhinology and laryngology. This gift was made shortly following Dr. deRoaldes' term as President of the Association. A modification of the original purpose suggested by the Association to include the entire accomplishments of the candidate rather than a specific single presentation was accepted in 1915 by Mrs. de Roaldes.

At present the income from this Fund is devoted to the granting of an Award known as the "deRoaldes Award" for achievement in rhinology and laryngology.

The Award is made available once in every three years "to an individual in the Americas who, by his outstanding accomplishments and contributions in the field of rhinology and laryngology is recognized as worthy of this especial honor."

The recipient of this Award is selected as follows:

- (a) A Committee of five Fellows shall be appointed by the Council every third year, immediately following its organization at the Annual Meeting of the Association. The method of discovery of this Award shall be determined entirely by the members of the Committee, excepting that the Committee shall notify each member of the Association that it has under consideration a selection of candidates for this Award and requests nominations. These nominations to the Committee shall be received not later than three months after the Committee has notified the members of the Association. The Committee may select a candidate from these nominations. In the event of the discovery of a candidate, the Committee shall notify the Secretary one month in advance of the Annual Meeting of the Association. Should there not be a suitable candidate discovered, then there shall be no selection until another three years has elapsed. Committee shall function during the year prior to submitting its report.
- (b) The prospective recipient of the deRoaldes Award shall be an individual who is a resident of the Americas, and who has so distinguished himself in rhinology and laryngology that he is outstanding. Fellows of the American Laryngological Association shall be eligible for this Award.
- (c) The President shall make the Award at an Annual Meeting. It may be given in absentia.
- (d) The Award shall consist of a gold medal, suitably inscribed on the obverse with a figure of Hippocrates, a staff and serpents, a wreath of laurel surrounded by the words "American Laryngological Association." The reverse shall be inscribed "deRoaldes Award for Achievement in Rhinology and Laryngology," and the recipient's name and year. The size of the medal shall be approximately 45 mm. in diameter. The medal shall be accompanied by a suitably inscribed certificate, properly signed by the President, Secretary and Historian.

The Secretary is charged with the preparation of the medal and the certificate.

#### THE CASSELBERRY AWARD

In 1906 a legacy of \$5000 was received by the Association from the Estate of Dr. William E. Casselberry, who served as President in 1898. It was stipulated that the interest from this sum "shall be used either in whole or in part and either alone or in conjunction with any similar fund, for a prize award, decoration or expense to encourage advancement in the art and science of laryngology and rhinology."

In recent years conditions have permitted this prize to be offered annually. It consists of a certificate, signed by the President, Secretary and Historian, accompanied by a sum of money determined annually by the Council. The regulations governing this Prize are as follows:

- (a) This award, to be known as the "Casselberry Award," shall consist of a suitable sum of money agreed upon by the Council, after the manuscript or work has been evaluated by the Award Committee. It may be awarded in whole or in part among several contestants.
- (b) The President of the Association shall annually appoint a Committee on Award consisting of three members. They shall determine the successful contestant or contestants, and shall inform the Secretary at least one month before the Annual Meeting. This Committee shall be anonymous.
- (c) Eligible contestants may be (1) hospital interns, residents or graduate students in rhinology and laryngology; (2) an individual with an M. D. degree, who is actively practicing or teaching rhinology and laryngology in the Americas and (3) any scientific worker in the field of rhinology and laryngology.
- (d) Theses to receive consideration must be typewritten, double-spaced on one side of the sheet, or printed.
- (e) The successful thesis shall become the property of the Association, but this provision shall in no way interfere with publication of the thesis in the journal of the author's choice. Contributions will be returned promptly to their authors.
- (f) All manuscripts entered in a given year must be in the hands of the Secretary before March 1.

- (g) The award will be made at the Annual Meeting of the Association. The award may be made in absentia.
- (h) The award shall be based on originality of material, scientific and clinical value, suitability for this award, and method of presentation, style, illustrations and references.
